Where has life taken you since you left WSDP and PCEP?

I graduated from Plymouth-Canton High School in 1992. After high school I went to Henry Ford Community College. I received an Associated Degree in Mass Communication and volunteered at the college radio station WHFR. At WHFR I was an onair host of a sampler program, an indie rock show and from time to time I would do a pre-record bluegrass/folk or world/folk show. My final year at HFCC and at WHFR as I student I became program director.

Then on Paczki Day (Fat Tuesday) 1995 I moved to Florida to attend the University of Central Florida in Orlando. While at UCF I earned a Bachelor's Degree in Radio-Television and I worked at WUCF. When I started at WUCF it was a university radio station with NPR affiliation. In the evening they played jazz and at night the student volunteers played indie rock. Then WUCF became a Public Radio station and changed the format to all jazz. I was then offered a 4-nights a week late-night slot playing jazz, acid jazz, trip-hop and ambient music. The best part of doing the late-night slot at WUCF was that it was my first paid radio job.
